FROM OUR FOUNDERS

2017 was an exciting year for Care for Children. We saw remarkable growth in our project work and staff numbers, and our newest project launched in Vietnam.

On the 20th November 2017, Care for Children made national news as we launched our partnership with the Vietnamese Ministry of Labour, Invalids and Social Affairs to help set up a family placement service as a positive alternative to institutional care.

In August, we experienced a typical English summer evening (rain) at Newday Festival, which brought together 7,000 young people to hear myself and Francis Chan, our global ambassador, speak about Care for Children's work. Amazingly the young people raised £50,000 for our work in China.

On the back of this, Care for Children was involved in an extremely successful trip to Phnom Penh in Cambodia, joined by Lord Laming, where together with Global Alliance for Children, USAID and Save the Children, we put forward our proposal of support to the Cambodian government. Following this visit, Care for Children was invited to conduct an important piece of research to understand the current child welfare system in Cambodia.

Lastly, in October a team visited Hong Kong where we launched our 'Five Cities' initiative at our Window into China event. I believe this exciting initiative has reignited our fundraising efforts in Hong Kong and it was wonderful to see Bear Grylls, Care for Children's UK Ambassador, speak so passionately about Care for Children.

I hope you enjoy reading more about our work within this 2017 annual report. I want to thank all our supporters who have got behind the vision to see some of the most disadvantaged children in the world have the opportunity to grow up in a family. In 2018, we will celebrate our 20th year working in China. Stay with us as we change the face of a generation of orphaned and abandoned children!

OUR MISSION

We partner with governments in Asia to help create a positive alternative to institutional care through local family-based care for disadvantaged children.

OUR VISION

Care for Children's vision is to see a million children moved from institutional care into families.

THE PROBLEM

There is an urgent but almost unknown tragedy in the world today.

There are millions of children living in institutional care worldwide.

This is despite the fact that over the last 50 years child development specialists have concluded that "residential institutions consistently fail to meet children's developmental needs."

THE SOLUTION

Why are so many children still growing up in orphanages?

Many countries lack the skills and resources necessary to make the transition from institutional care to family-based care.

This is where Care for Children comes in.

Our team of social work experts train state-run orphanage staff in family-based care and social work, empowering them to recruit, assess and train suitable foster families. We also train them to place, support and monitor children as they move from the orphanage into these loving families for the long-term.

Care for Children partners with governments in Asia who want to make this transition, but lack the tools needed to see it through sustainably.




WHO WE WORK WITH

A fundamental aspect of Care for Children's work is that we will only work at the invitation of governments in order to make the greatest impact.

Our strategy works because it brings about policy change at the top levels of government, as well as grassroots change for frontline staff in state-run orphanages. It produces almost immediate results while ensuring long-term sustainability, and transforms the lives of countless orphaned children while costing the government less than their current care provision.




OUR TRACK RECORD

Care for Children was founded as a government backed pilot project in Shanghai in 1998. Funded by the UK's Department of International Development, our founder Robert Glover received an expert licence to work for the Shanghai Civil Affairs Bureau.

Robert was first invited to introduce family placement at the Shanghai Children's Welfare Institution. After the great success of the pilot, the Beijing government asked Robert to move to Beijing in 2003 to act as an advisor to China's Ministry of Civil Affairs and to roll out foster care across China, in partnership with the China Association of Social Workers (CASW).

Robert received the White Magnolia Award from the Mayor of Shanghai for outstanding services to the city in 2002, and an OBE from Queen Flizabeth II in 2005 for his work in China

OUR PROJECTS 2017

CHINA

In 2017, Care for Children entered its 19th year working in China. During 2017, we put in place some positive changes to prepare for 2018. With the enactment of the National Policy of Foster Care, governmental social welfare institutions (SWIs) have secured financial support from the government for living costs of children placed in foster families.

With this in mind, Care for Children will no longer provide funding for family allowances in China. Instead, we will invest funds into SWIs to improve their own training capacity. This will enable the SWIs to develop their own trainers in family-placement, and with the support of Care for Children, will be able to support themselves and other organisations by acting as 'training hubs'.

We have also been working on re-purposing un-used orphanage buildings. Five key SWIs have been nominated to become the pioneers; Kunming, Chengdu, Xining, Yinchuan, and Datong. With our support, they will create community resource centres. These centres are located in local communities, and designed to support local families with vulnerable children. They may require education, rehabilitation, life skill trainings and other forms of therapy. By developing these centres, SWIs can re-model services and convert institutions into day-care or family resource centres. Our team works alongside with SWIs by offering technical and financial support.

Government Relationship

Working with governments is critical to our work in China. 2017 has witnessed the renewal of the partnership between Care for Children and the China Association of Social Workers. This partnership oversees and supports the national foster care project, which involves 20 SWIs from 19 provinces/cities. A new partnership with Zhongshe Social Work Development Foundation was set up in early 2017. This collaboration will allow Care for Children to develop an online resource base for family placement, in the hope that, in the near future, an online community can serve all SWIs and social services for children by sharing international best practice, local experience and training courses.

Project Spotlights

This year, the China team delivered eight training sessions reaching 260 people across 53 orphanages in 21 provinces. Furthermore, 20 SWIs delivered training in family placement independently of Care for Children, for over 950 people.

In July, Care for Children hosted a delegation from China. The group included government officials and directors from orphanages across China. Their visit was filled with meetings and activities to introduce our guests to the UK and to discuss and share ideas on social welfare, with the aim to better understand and improve practices, develop relationships and learn from each other.

OUR PROJECTS 2017

THAILAND

Following renewed support from The IKEA Foundation, the Thai project has progressed with much the same momentum with which it left off in 2016. With the aim of rolling-out our family placement training across the country, the team completed core level training of all 20 government-run care institutions – a major achievement seeing as we only started our work in Thailand just five years ago!

Over the course of the year, the training team delivered 59 workshops for 15 care institutions, and completed core training for the last group of five institutions: one located in the south of Thailand, one in the north- east and three in the central region, in total caring for over 1,300 children. A decision was made to hold the training sessions at each of the five project sites so that the maximum number of participants could attend, rather than at our training centre in the north. As four of the five institutions are homes for babies and are often quite short staffed, it is difficult for the caregivers to be gone for much longer than a day, therefore it is better if the training is on-site, even though some may have just completed a night shift beforehand.


In February, we held a National Foster Care Meeting in Chiang Mai for over 130 people including representatives from all 20 care institutions, as well as senior government figures. We were delighted to present certificates to 81 people who had completed our core-level training. A further

84 people were presented with certificates in November.
One of the highlights of the meeting was visiting local foster families and letting participants see first-hand how being part of a family can change a child's life.

"I am totally in favour of placing children from government orphanages into foster families, because I see the impact that living in an institution has on the children's development and well-being. I want the children to be part of a family and receive all the quality care and warmth that a family can give. It would make such a difference to the caregivers in the orphanages if there were less children because as it is now, each of the buildings are so full and the caregivers are tired and stressed. My dream is to be able to move a whole building of children into foster families. Then we would be able to use that building as a child development centre."

While the government continues to steer planning and policy in the direction of alternative care, this year budget cuts meant that there was no increase in the quotas for foster family allowances, which made it difficult for some of the care institutions to place children with families. However, following several meetings with the government and Care for Children stepping in to cover the shortfall, we learnt in December that the government has made foster family allowances available to all 20 institutions for 2018. This really is wonderful news.



OUR PROJECTS 2017

VIETNAM

On June 1st 2017 the Vietnamese government enacted their new Child Law, which introduces legislative support for family-based care in local communities for orphaned and vulnerable children. In July, Care for Children signed an exclusive three-year Cooperation Agreement with the Ministry of Labour, Invalids and Social Affairs (MoLISA) to work in partnership with the Department of Children's Affairs (DCA) on a pilot foster care programme in Hanoi and Thai Nguyen.

In November, MoLISA hosted an official project launch ceremony, attended by other Ministries, all relevant national, provincial and city government departments, the British Ambassador, and other relevant national and international agencies, revealing the widespread support across all sectors of society in Vietnam to support this new direction in their child welfare system.

The Annual Work Plan for 2018, prepared in cooperation with the DCA, and approved by MoLISA, sees the launch of Care for Children's training programme, with a goal to place the first children into families by the end of the year. Our Training Manager from the China project, Mrs Emma Zhang, will join the team in Hanoi, Vietnam, bringing with her extensive knowledge and expertise to ensure the project gets off to the strongest possible start.



PRIORITIES FOR 2018

In 2018, Care for Children will celebrate its 20th year working in Asia helping disadvantaged children move from orphanages into families.

Our three projects in China, Thailand and Vietnam will continue to go from strength to strength in their development stages, with China preparing for independence, Thailand rolling out its core training and Vietnam kicking off its pilot project. With this in mind, we have some exciting events and projects lined up for the year to engage our supporters and raise our profile as we reach this important milestone.

In March, the Care for Children team will travel to Chiang Mai for our Global Training Conference.

In April, by invitation of the government, Care for Children will conduct a research trip with our patron HRH Michael of Kent in Nepal and India.



In May, we will visit Sweden to showcase our 'Five Cities' initiative at our 'Window into China' exhibition. We will also conduct a research trip to Russia in partnership with their government.

In June, Care for Children founders Robert and Elizabeth Glover will fly to Shanghai where they will film a documentary based on interviews with five children that were placed into families 20 years ago.

In July, we will host our 2nd annual Family Fun Day in Norwich, UK.

During October, Care for Children will return to Shanghai to hold a conference on family placement in Asia.



On 29th October, Care for Children will celebrate its official 20th birthday, which marks the date that we signed our agreement with the Chinese Government.



In December, we will celebrate our 20th year by holding our annual Christmas Gala Dinner at one of London's royal palaces.


FINANCE

PROJECT SUPPORT


