

1 Executive Director's message

This year has been a big challenge for all of us. Only through good families are we able to get through this together - families make the difference. I want to thank the families of all our team members, the families of our trustees and the families of our funding partners in their help to get *Care for Children* through the year.

Last year, as the COVID-19 pandemic began, we were all instantly affected with our teams in Thailand, China, Vietnam and Cambodia. From school closures to lockdowns, from suffering economies to new protocols on how we could go about our daily lives, no one's life went untouched. What wasn't clear to many was that there was also a growing and yet hidden pandemic among children. A recent report has found that 2 million children have experienced the death of a parent or grandparent caregiver. That's one child experiencing loss every 12 seconds.

The report casts an alarming picture of the needs facing children globally, and it also shows how now is the time to promote family strengthening, to ensure that children do not needlessly end up in orphanages or institutions. We have learned from history that orphanages are not the solution to care for orphans and vulnerable children, so we must act now in order to protect children.

It was in Bangkok, Thailand, that the heart-warming story hit national news: the tragedy of twin girls who orphaned when their mother died of COVID-19, were able to soften their dreadful loss when they were placed directly into a family rather than an institution!

In October, Hodder (London) released *'As Many As The Stars'* a book about our family's journey in China over the last 20 years to help China set up a family placement system that has placed over one million children back into Chinese families. The book is available from Amazon.

We have also finished a 60-minute documentary feature called *'Children of Shanghai'*. Narrated by Bear Grylls, it documents the transformational outcomes of six children who were placed into families twenty years ago in Shanghai during the pilot project stage of *Care for Children*'s work in China. We are excited about releasing it to the world in 2021!

As we are getting to grips with the fact that children need families, there has never been a greater time to get behind *Care for Children* as we digitalise our methodology and training with a new push to see governments around the world develop family placement as a positive alternative to institutional care.

2 Vision, Mission & Model

Vision

To see 'A world of **children in families!**'


Mission

To serve governments of nations to pioneer a positive alternative to institutional care by placing children into local, loving families in the community (fostering and adoption).

Model

The core focus of *Care for Children*'s work is to re-train institutional childcare staff to become family placement workers in the local community to place children into local families, and subsequently free up space and resources for the local authorities to offer a wider range of childcare services and preventative measures.





Stakeholders

1. Governments

Care for Children recognises a government's responsibility to protect its citizens. All of *Care for Children*'s country projects are established and managed with an MOU at Ministry level, and implemented with local government.

2. Children

Care for Children focusses on seeing children in care moved into families as a positive alternative to institutions. All of *Care for Children*'s work from government relations, to training, to fundraising, is shaped by reaching this goal.

3. Families

Care for Children recognises families as the real 'heroes' of family placement work, meaning their support is critical to the success of good, long-term placements. Prospective and experienced families are frequently involved in *Care for Children*'s training activities, together with family care workers.

4. Family placement staff

Care for Children's professional approach is based on retraining institutional care staff to become family placement workers who are able to manage the transition of children from residential care into local families, with a particular focus on permanence. This is a specialist field of work within the alternative care spectrum, but the greater, indirect impact (i.e. theory of change) can lead to improved child welfare services and preventative measures for all children.



From 1998, *Care for Children* supported the Chinese government to transition from an institutional care system to a family care model for orphans and vulnerable children. The government took on the responsibility for implementing family care, while *Care for Children* provided consultation and training, empowering government staff to ensure the quality and sustainability of the project.

Care for Children also provided technical support and seed-funding in the way of government matched family allowances (50%) to build models of best practice and design, and deliver a national family care training programme. This empowered the government to enact legislative support for family care in 2015, and by 2018 the Chinese bureau of statistics revealed that over one million vulnerable children were living in families instead of institutions.

Following invitations from a number of governments across Asia, *Care for Children* has also gone on to develop successful programmes with the governments of Thailand and Vietnam.



National Strategy

Care for Children creates bespoke training materials and programmes to suit the unique political and cultural characteristics of each country that we work in. This enables nationwide, systemic developments to a child welfare system, therefore securing long-term sustainable change, and millions of vulnerable children placed into local, loving families.



4 2020 Project

China

The China project successfully moved into a new era of work designed to pioneer *Care for Children's* digitalisation developments that are critical for our new vision to see 'a world of children in families'.

The project team was downsized to focus on specialist roles, now with a focus on overseeing quality control and management of *Care for Children's* training resources and programmes online.


Four national centres of excellence in family placement have been carefully selected to work with *Care for Children* in Yinchuan (North), Chengdu (Central), Kunming (South West), and Nanning (South).

Thailand

In 2020 *Care for Children's* target groups for training expanded again to include foster family workers from Child Welfare Homes, Shelters for Children and Families, and the Provincial Office of Social Development and Human Security in six provinces: Chiang Mai, Lampang, Nakhon Si Thammarat, Nonthaburi, Khon Kaen and Buriram.

These six provinces are part of a government pilot project to further expand the scope of foster care, so that family-based care will not be limited only to provinces that have Child Welfare Homes.

2020 became the first year in which the government included family placement services as part of their annual review of Child Welfare Homes.



achievements

Vietnam


The two pilot institutions in Hanoi and Thai Nguyen have been prepared for their first family placements in accordance to Vietnamese law. Following the completion of the core and foundation training programme for all government agencies, this involved direct work with local government, and on-site training at the institutions.

The first child assessments took place to identify children suitable for a family placement, and a local recruitment process for foster parents began in each location.

By the end of 2020 each pilot project was fully prepared to place the first children into families.

Cambodia

Following the national family placement conference in Phnom Penh, October 2019, *Care for Children* has established a permanent presence in the city, working closely with the government to register as an NGO, set up an office, agree a working partnership and launch the project.

Rising to the Covid challenge

Care for Children's country project teams have had to think on their feet over the last 12 months, rearranging their calendars, changing training programmes, and adapting to a more online approach to their work. There are internet hiccups here and there but for the most part the training has gone ahead according to our original schedule.

As we continue to develop our digitalisation tools and strategy (which we started before COVID!), for our new vision for 'A world of **children in families**', we have also found it a useful insight into how online training could be managed.

Following are some reflections from 2020:

Relationships are still our priority

Online training is making it possible to not only do the training, but also continue and even build relationships with the participants, even though we are not able to meet together in person. We can see that everyone is getting much more adept with their on-line training skills too!

Extra effort on both sides

One day the internet went down during a training session. Our training team had to request that the training be postponed that day, and were delighted when all the participants were willing to change their own schedules so we could fit the training in on another day.

Making it fun

Participants have expressed that they enjoy the training and our novel training atmosphere. Lots of fun tools, such as apps are used to make the training engaging and keep interest high. We have quizzes and competitions throughout the training and at the end of the training week those who have earned prizes can expect to get a little surprise in the mail!

Keeping it real

Case studies are used so that the participants can see how the theory of running foster care is carried out in practice. For example, participants use these case studies to plan how they would run a foster care program. It is a great way to practice all the intricacies of doing recruitment, assessment, care planning, child and family preparation, follow-up and contact with birth families. We get lots of positive feedback from the participants and comments about how much they enjoy working with the case studies. They use the same case throughout each process, and it's common to receive feedback from participants commenting that they almost feel like they personally know the child and family by the end of the training.

Staying creative

In one case in the Thai project, the training team were surprised and delighted to see how well the participants did at creating an online life story book. When they do this activity in person they can sit and cut out photos and draw, but since working online they have to use a different set of tools and skills – and the results were very impressive.

Our teams have adapted, innovated and tirelessly continued to serve our government partners and the families amidst the global pandemic.

Digitalisation update

This year we have taken our written training and made the first steps towards digitalising it. We have created a digital platform as we prepare for our training to go online, and the groundwork has begun for the development of our first eight training videos.

In order to create video content of the highest quality, we have partnered with an experienced and well-regarded media company to ensure that this tool is being made with excellence. Our work to date has involved a careful process of adapting training content into separate scripts ready for presentation in front of camera, as well as the creation of some of the visual elements for these videos. Interviews are also being prepared with foster-carers and government officials who are able to bring real life experience to the theoretical concepts that are being taught in our training.



Project Data Tool (PDT)

As *Care for Children* expands, we have recognised the need to centralise our project data into an online tool that can be accessed and managed across all our project sites. Instead of outsourcing the work, we utilised the skills and expertise of our staff, particularly our Systems Project Manager, Graham Hammond, who also takes care of all of *Care for Children*'s IT needs. We successfully designed, developed and launched the Project Data Tool all in 2020, and all in-house!

In 2020 we developed Phase 1 of our online Project Data Tool (PDT). The PDT is our centralised, private and online database that allows staff to pool details of key data, allowing us to compare and monitor progress, spot trends, assess internally, and inform a variety of reporting requirements.

China

Wenwen's story

Wenwen is a healthy 18-year-old woman, with a clear sense of direction and purpose. But her life could have been very different if it wasn't for a combination of compassion, good care planning, and loving support.

She was abandoned when she was very young, and found by an elderly couple, 'Grandpa and Grandma Hao'. Grandpa Hao contacted Taiyuan Social Welfare Institute (SWI) for their advice, and when Grandpa and Grandma Hao shared with the staff at Taiyuan SWI that they were willing to care for Wenwen, they were shown how they could become her foster parents. It was a successful placement, and Wenwen enjoyed a healthy and stable early life with her 'Grandpa and Grandma Hao'.

However, in 2016, it became clear that Grandpa and Grandma Hao's old age was beginning to limit their ability to care for Wenwen safely. The social workers communicated with them, and

listened to everyone's feelings and thoughts. After several meetings, and careful planning, Wenwen moved to a new family during the summer vacation of her last year in middle school. Both of her new foster parents work in a school, and they lost their only child in an accident. Her social workers help her keep in regular contact with Grandpa and Grandma Hao.

Wenwen did experience some difficulties in coping with academic tasks in her new school, but her family took good care of both her life and study. During the college entrance examinations, which are a particularly challenging time for students in China, her parents made extra efforts to support her. Social workers continued to make home visits to understand the needs of both Wenwen and her foster parents, often helping to coordinate resources they needed. With the help of her parents and social workers, as well as through her own resilience, Wenwen's academic performance improved, as did her interest in learning. Wenwen has just finished taking her college entrance exam, and says she wants to major in history.

Wenwen's story is a beautiful example of what can happen when a family's compassion is supported with the scaffolding of a well-functioning foster-care system.


Care for Children files its consolidated accounts with the UK Charity Commission and Companies House.
